WAG work for the financial year 2017 - 2018

Willingham Beerfest June 2017

Some sixteen WAG volunteers assisted with the Beerfest, WAG took responsibility for general organisation including providing glasses, organisation at the door, producing the programme, erecting and dismantling the marquee, etc. The WAG profit was £2300 and £1800 of this is pledged to the Social Club for improvements including the disabled toilet. Most of the remainder will be used to pay for our annual subscription for public liability insurance. After a very successful Beerfest which attracted about 1000 people from far and wide we did discuss whether we should ask WAG volunteers to give up time in a situation where commercial concerns were making a profit. However, the majority of this group felt that it was a very worthwhile village event and that we should consider our position next year.

Willingham Feast October 2017

The WAG Feast Group headed by Mike Tidball worked hard, as usual, to make the Feast a success. Willingham history and the Social Club figured highly in the 2017 Feast programme. The first weekend started with a guided tour of the most historic wall paintings in St Mary and All Saints which was well attended. The Feast then continued with a bang caused by some heavy metal emanating from Willingham Social Club when the AC/DC tribute band, 'Let There B/DC' performed there.

The third Feast event, Thurston's funfair on the Green, was followed by Custard Comedy at the Social Club to help raise money for the installation of a disabled toilet. The comedy nights are always sold out as they are so good. The Compere, Jonathan Elston, was brilliant at interacting with the audience and we had two 'normal' very funny comedians followed by the headliners, Raymond and Mr Timpkins. You will never see another act like this, they resembled Laurel and Hardy but with the film speeded up ten times faster. Their very clever act involved non-stop clips from songs accompanied by dozens of props.

On Feast Saturday and Sunday we had three exhibitions in the village; one run by the Octagon art group, one by the photography club, and the library hosted an historical perspective of Willingham with material from the 'Old Willingham' website and material from the Cambridgeshire Collection. The photography and art displays were as outstanding as ever and one is reminded that there are so many talented people in the village. On Saturday night Willingham School Association ran a ceilidh. By the end, like most ceilidhs, everyone was hot, happy and slightly confused for at times it resembled the game 'British Bulldog.'

Feast Sunday started with the cycle ride to Ely, which looked wonderful in the sunshine. Later the Treasure Hunt around the village started with a search for older buildings and other points of interest. We must apologise that, for the very first time in many years, there was no concert on the Green by a Salvation Army

Band. It was cancelled at the last minute for reasons beyond our control. The band did perform in the church in the evening.

The final weekend started with a70s/80s disco, I believe the audience would not let the DJ go home until the early hours. On Saturday Willingham Youth Trust held a very successful family Disco and the Feast finished with Willingham Wine Club's wine quiz, nearly 70 people tasted large amounts of wine over the course of four hours and the event concluded with dancing to the excellent band 'Word of Mouth.'

OEII Field Play Equipment

COMMUNITY ORCHARD

The fruit trees are now well established, 120 in all with 114 on the grid as illustrated on the Orchard Board. Trees on more vigorous root stocks are making appreciable growth, although some trees have yet to bear fruit. The original spiral guards have now been replaced with expandable mesh guards. We are grateful to Edward Gilbert who continues to cut the grass on a volunteer basis.

Bulb planting has been repeated for a second year, with the mixture of bulbs referred to below under a section on flora and fauna. The bulbs planted last winter, along with the wild flowers, gave a good seasonal display appreciated by those who are regular visitors to the orchard.

The woodland area is beginning to look like a woodland with excellent autumn colours on display this winter, and providing good cover for children to play hide and seek. The 25 native species planted are listed on the Woodland Board. Two picnic benches located in a circular area on the edge of the wood makes a great place to sit. The basket willow patch has been slow to establish but we look forward to the first woven item being produced.

Melvyn and Brenda Smith, WAG volunteers with an interest in wildlife, make regular visits to the orchard and contribute to the Willingham News. They have summarised below flora and fauna encountered in the Orchard: Flora: wild English daffodil, English bluebells, snakes head fritillaries, wild/woodland garlic, round-headed garlic, wild/woodland tulip, primroses and cowslips, marsh-mallow, lady's bedstraw, creeping bindweed, black knapweed, field scabious and meadow cranesbill plus several grass varieties. Plus, of course, all our planted native trees and bushes.

Fauna: Various species of grasshoppers, beetles and flies. Two species of damselfly and ruddy darter dragonfly. Butterflies – small copper, meadow brown, gatekeeper, small tortoiseshell, common blue, large white and small skipper plus silvery moth and other unidentified day-flying moths. Bird species: barn owl, rook, crow, jackdaw and magpie, bullfinch, starling, robin, wren, dunnock and blackbird, blue and great tit and of course, woodpigeon.

Melvyn and Brenda try to visit the Orchard, at least twice each month but cannot hope to find, or see, all the species that are likely to visit or establish. Undoubtedly, more species will be found, particularly as the Orchard matures and it would be great if more villagers visited to add to our knowledge of this wonderful village asset. Why not take your children, not only to play (which is important!) but also to discover and learn? They'll love it! Do let us know what you find.

QEII

The transformation of the QEII play area was completed earlier this year and is attracting ever increasing numbers, so much so that WAG applied for funding from the SCDC Community Chest, after receiving an initial generous donation from Vintage Travel based in Willingham, for the provision of more seating. A circular bench to surround a feature of three white barked Silver Birches, earlier sponsored by Vintage Travel, plus three plank benches to be placed by the under 5's play area.

The planting of sponsored trees was completed last winter bringing the total to 50, plus one planted earlier on the recreation ground. This made it possible to commission a promised sign board listing the trees and their sponsors with tree location identified on an aerial photo of the QEII field. The board will soon be installed. Thanks go to Cambridge Aerial Surveys for the photo and to Siobhan Brown for repeating her creative work on design and art work.

As always, WAG recognize the continued support of WPC and their maintenance input.

Website

Our new website was launched at the end of 2017 and we are very happy with it so far. Our thanks go to Ackbar Joolia, our web manager, and Guy Beauchamp for all his help with this and the previous website. The web address remains the same at www.willinghamlife.org

We hope to increase cooperation between other groups in the village.
