

# **WILLINGHAM PARISH COUNCIL ANNUAL REPORT 2022 - 2023**



## PARISH COUNCILS – WHO ARE THEY?

Parish and Town Councils are the level of local government closest to the needs of local people. Parish and Town councils are created in law and are required to act within the laws by exercising the powers and functions which have been conferred on them by Acts of Parliament. However, these laws give the Parish and Town council a wide remit within which to improve the lives of their local community. The Council collects a precept each year (a sum collected with the council tax each year from the householders in the parish) specifically intended to maintain and improve facilities and services for local people. The precept for 2023/2024 is £166,600.

Parish and Town Councils are the least bureaucratic and the cheapest form of local government in existence. All sums collected are invested in the needs of the Parish itself. They are elected bodies and as such are responsible and responsive to their local electorate.

### WILLINGHAM PARISH COUNCIL

Willingham Parish Council is made up of 15 Councillors all of whom are volunteers. The period of office of a Councillor is normally 4 years, but if they have been co-opted or elected at a by-election, they will serve until the next normal election. Due to the Northstowe Governance Review the Council held their elections a year early in May 2021. The term of office will run for 5 years to bring the next election in line with District Council Elections.

## CHAIR'S REPORT

I would like to thank all the members of the Parish Council for their hard work and dedication over the past year. We have accomplished much, and I am confident that we can continue to keep our village a great place to live.

The Council could not function without the excellent work and support of our office staff. As ever, I am extremely grateful for their assistance and advice. To cope with the ever-increasing responsibilities, and with an eye to future succession, this year we welcomed our new Deputy Clerk, Amy Rudderham. We now have better holiday and sick leave coverage and can make progress on some overdue office projects.

Late last year there was some confusion over the state of the Public Hall with conflicting information from the Public Hall Users Committee and the scouts. After an initial consultation and public meeting, the situation was clarified: although there is no immediate change needed, something will need to be done to modernise and repair this much-loved village amenity, or to provide an alternative venue. Finding the finances for such work is a daunting challenge for the future, which will require imagination and agreement from all parties.

Initiatives and ongoing activities during the last year include:

### **Highways**

- The footpath to the Community Orchard and associated 40mph buffer zone was finally completed. This was paid for by the A14 Legacy Fund.
- Our Local Highways Improvement bid for Station Road was implemented.
- We are using Northstowe S106 funds for road safety in surrounding villages to have speed bumps installed on Rampton Road.
- After a renewed commitment from the Police, we are helping to set up a Speed Watch group to monitor and reduce speeding through the village.

### **Environment**

- There has been extensive work on the Meadow Road site by the councillors for Greens & Boundaries with the excellent assistance of many volunteers. Donated trees have been planted to reinforce the boundary hedges. We are working with Cambridgeshire ACRE and New Life on the Old West to create a wildlife pond at the rear of the site, entirely funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund. We have installed a remotely viewable CCTV camera to combat the fly-tipping which was blighting the entrance.
- An information board supplied by Willingham Action Group was installed at Barton's Field.

### **Social and Wellbeing**

- A new defibrillator has now been installed in the redundant phone box on the High Street. The village is now well provided, with Council defibrillators at the library and school and a Football Association defibrillator on the Pavilion.
- The Community Warden now has 14 users in Willingham (and 4 in Over) providing companionship and support with everyday errands.
- The Parish Council fund 14 community lifeline units for residents who need them.
- We donated £3,000 to Over Day Centre which supports many of our elderly residents.

### **Community**

- The Community Plan group are still working hard analysing the many comments received. Once published, the findings will guide and influence the Parish Council's priorities over the coming years.
- The planning application for the Multi-Use Games Area (MUGA) is proceeding with glacial speed. Having already added a "ball strike" survey, we have now had to commission a two-part ecological report with a summer component, thus delaying the submission for several more months.
- The Council has a modest grant budget each year which is allocated to applicants on a case-by-case basis in line with our policy.

### **Support**

- We provide free use of the recreation ground and pavilion for the Wolves youth football teams.
- Community Groups are given one free booking in the hall each year to help them raise funds for their groups.

- We provide financial support to Willingham News so that it can continue its excellent job of delivering the magazine to every household each month.
- We give funds to the Willingham Youth Trust for the Connexions Bus Workers.
- We provide the Public Hall rent free to the Scouts.

## CEMETERY

It was good that the War Memorial in The Cemetery was able to be the focus of our 'Remembrance Day' service again. Due to Covid19 restrictions participation had been restricted for the past few years. It was a very well attended time by Village Uniformed Organisations, The Royal British Legion, representatives of The Army and Air Force Cadets. Many village residents also attended.

In the coming months the west corner of The Cemetery wall will be taken down and repaired. The extreme weather conditions over the past few years, along with roots from the large tree in the corner has been causing cracks in the wall. The work is the result of a survey by a structural engineer.

The Parish's five yearly tree survey identified what works needed to be carried out to maintain the trees in The Cemetery. This will happen over the coming months.

In the winter months three new replacement trees were planted around the Cemetery

Unfortunately, there have been several incidents of vandalism. These have varied in nature. These incidents have been monitored and resolved.

Maintenance of The Cemetery is now undertaken by 'Buchans'. We are grateful for the work carried out to make The Cemetery accessible for visitors.

We would like to express our thanks to Mark who continues to empty the dustbins into the 'Eurobin'.

## GREEN AND BOUNDARIES

### Community Orchard

The community orchard continues to thrive and maintenance responsibility has now been handed back to the council with the continued support and help of the dedicated volunteers who continue to look after it. The new foot path has finally been constructed to make getting to the orchard safer for residents.



## Village Green



The village green pump has been refurbished and a new sign regarding parking put up. Following a tree survey, the large red chestnut tree has had to be cut down due to disease and old age. A replacement tree will be planted over the coming weeks.

The tree survey also highlighted that the remaining chestnut trees on the perimeter of the green are also coming to the end of their lives and at some point in the future will need replacement.

## Barton Field

Following the planting of a new hedgerow on the perimeter most of the whips survived last year's heatwave thanks to the assistance of volunteers with watering. We want residents to enjoy the space but would ask that they respect neighbouring private land and keep to the permissive walkways only. Willingham Action Group (WAG) have kindly had a notice board made detailing the history of the site which has now been put in place at the entrance.



## Pyrethrum Way

Both greens continue to be maintained by the Council and some tree works will be carried out following the recent survey.

## Wild Meadow Field (Meadow Road)

This has been a new project this year with lots of work having been carried out to improve the site for all to use.

Myself and Cllr Ramsden have liaised with County Council officers to put together a bio diversity report with the aim of making the most of the site. We have also worked with the Wildlife Trust and were successful in bidding for 450 hedging plants and trees to enhance the site.

In addition 3 trees were provided by South Cambridgeshire District Council and a couple from parishioners.

The trees and hedging have all been planted in the last month with the help of the 10 volunteers who turned out to help and Atlas Tree Surgery very kindly donated 4 trailers of wood mulch to put round the newly planted hedging to help them on their way.

A camera was successfully installed on site to try and help reduce fly tipping and to hold those that do fly tip, accountable for it.



Following discussions with Cambridgeshire ACRE it has been agreed that they will provide a wildlife pond to the rear of the site which will hopefully be in place by the end of the year.

I would like to thank everyone who has helped with the project so far and given up their valuable time and resources to enhance this area for the whole village to enjoy.

The next stage for the project will be to locate the water pipe so that new saplings can be watered if needed and to further develop the biodiversity on the site. We are in early talks with a developer, looking at options to enhance and expand what has already been put in place so hopefully we will continue to see the project go from strength to strength.

## LEISURE AND AMENITIES

### Recreation Ground

#### *Formal games*

The Willingham Wolves football club continues to grow, with a very welcome increase in the number of girls and ladies taking part. Thanks are once again due to Jamie Smith and Ben Monks and the rest of their team of managers for running the club so successfully. Over two weekends in June they organised a very successful football festival. It was the second largest in East Anglia (and the largest girl's tournament in the county) with 272 teams taking part, with players aged between 6 and 15.



The Cricket Club has struggled for players in the past few years and during the winter of 2021/2 agreed to combine with Over Cricket Club to provide a bigger pool of players. During the 2022 season matches were held both in Willingham and Over. Unfortunately we had to dismantle the cricket nets structure next to the pavilion as it was becoming unsafe and repairs could not be arranged.

The Bowls club had a successful summer season and the green was reportedly one of the best to play on. There was a good influx of new members and they played matches in the Ely and District League and in the Business House League.

#### *Fen Gallop*

In July, the very popular annual Fen Gallop took place – a 10 k and 4 mile chipped timed run, with around 400 runners. This year saw the return of the Willingham Primary School summer fete immediately following the runs.

As with many of the activities described above, this success depended on the huge amount of work put in by teams of volunteers, and we are very grateful for their efforts. It is lovely to see the recreation ground being well used.

### *Jubilee Picnic*



Despite very bad luck with the weather (one of the only wet days over much of the summer!) this was a successful event with many stalls from village groups and some excellent music. Thanks are due to Paul Knighton and WAG for all the organisation.

### *Flooding*

There are still issues with the lower recreation ground flooding after any significant rain. Once again this year the whole area has been verti-drained which we hope has helped. This could be improved by some levelling of the ground, which has become more uneven over the past few years, but it is difficult to find a window to do this when the rec is not being used for cricket or football. We continue to endeavour to keep the ends of the drainage pipes into the lode clear.

### *Lack of pitch space*

This continues to be a problem. During the summer of 2021 we engaged closely with the updating of the Greater Cambridge Playing Pitch Strategy, providing detailed information and meeting with the consultants drawing the strategy up. In particular, we put the case for both our proposed tarmac tennis and netball courts and an artificial 3G football pitch. We understood that the report was due in the Spring or summer of 2022 but we have seen nothing as yet.

### *Car parking*

The Parish Council continues to press Highways regarding the very poor state of the parking area next to West Fen Road. Planings from local road resurfacing works were delivered for us to spread during the summer, which is hard work. But this is only a very temporary solution – passage of vehicles soon dislodges the stones and the holes quickly reappear. More work is already required.

### **QEII Field**



It is lovely to see this facility being well-used by families all year round. Due to wear and tear and some minor vandalism we have again spent several thousand pounds on repairing the equipment, and this will be an ongoing cost to the village. Work on turning the unused space alongside the lode into a wildflower meadow is progressing slowly. We were hoping that seeding could take place in the spring of 2023 but organising this is proving difficult.

To commemorate the Platinum Jubilee of our late Queen we installed a bench on the eastern side of the field to provide a sheltered place to enjoy viewing the playground.



### **Pavilion**

With the growth of Willingham Wolves football club comes a huge increase in the amount of equipment they need. The pavilion was built with almost no storage space and a working party has been set up to look at solutions.

### **MUGA – Two Tennis and Netball Courts**

Obtaining planning permission is proving difficult. Our application submitted in October 2021 had to be withdrawn in January 2022 as more information was required regarding ecology as badgers, bats and great crested newts, which are protected species, had been reported with 1 km of the site. Also, details of biodiversity net gain/enhancement measures are now required to mitigate the grass area lost to the courts. We employed an ecologist to provide a detailed report covering all these issues, plus some further information requested on parking, and resubmitted in September 2022.

But the planners raised further issues and the application was withdrawn again in January 2023. Our measures to protect bats were considered inadequate and a full bat survey is now required which cannot be started until June, when they become active again. Also, this time around Sport England were consulted and they required a cricket ball strike assessment, which has now been completed at a cost of £1200.

Finally, my thanks are due to my deputy lead councillor, Simon Clark, for his invaluable help in keeping up with the many minor repairs needed, and his support over the year in all aspects of L&A activities.

## **HALLS**

### **Ploughman Hall**



Bookings have been very busy over the last year with most evenings booked out by regular users and weekends popular again with party bookings. The new heating system continues to provide a cost effective and more manageable solution, whilst the occasional issue pops up in general the system has been working well and helps to reduce the





carbon footprint of the hall. One of the next items to tackle is storage space for the tables and chairs to allow the space currently being used to revert back to a usable meeting room.

### Public Hall

The Public Hall continues to be used by the Scouts on a regular basis. The hall has for some time needed a significant amount of upgrading and the Council has looked at various options including the possible sale of the hall. Consultation was paused whilst further discussions with the main users of the hall identified particular issues to be addressed, this is currently on going.

## PLANNING

The Planning Committee met 16 times during the year and considered 72 planning applications, 6 less than the previous year. The meetings averaged every 3 weeks and considered up to 12 applications. Members of the public are invited, though rarely attended. When they did, their considered comments enhanced the debate and the decisions reached.



Of the applications to be considered, 2 were in outline, 50 full, 3 for trees, 6 agricultural and 12 variations of conditions, etc. The committee made no recommendation for 28 of the applications, mostly for applications for conditions to applications previously approved by SCDC. There were 26 recommended for approval and 16 for refusal.

The planning committee has endeavoured to prevent all non-agricultural building outside the village envelope and has generally been successful. Also, gaining planning permission to change redundant agricultural buildings to domestic dwellings have been allowed, but attempts to replace these with new builds have been refused.

The planning committee considers all applications carefully and gives recommendations to SCDC based on the value of the proposals to the village in amenity and design, and the impact of any development on the residents. We are very conscious of the village status as a minor rural community and discourage any development outside the village framework.

## ENVIRONMENT AND SUSTAINABILITY

## Barton Field



This year has seen progress in Barton Field as the whips planted along the northern length last year, in spite of the adverse weather conditions, seem to have settled quite well. The mulching was completed in time for the dry weather and we were able to have some watering of the new hedge by the Garner family. It is too early to tell how many of the plants have survived this winter but the remaining look as if they will grow to fill any gaps, so no further in-filling is planned at present. It was decided to leave the space at

the far western end where whips were 'removed' as it could be time and money wasted. We are grateful for a grant from the SCDC Zero Carbon Communities scheme for help with finance for the hedge.

We are lucky to have continued support from Mike Tidball originally from WAG for the completion of the project working alongside Siobhan Brown and Paul Knighton, to provide an information board and have that placed just inside the entrance to Barton Field off the Black Pit drove. We held a brief ‘unveiling’ ceremony on 2 April. This coming year we hope to encourage more people to use the area, so nature trails and improved labelling are on the list for the future. The field itself is frequently used by walkers and we are considering plans to create a more circular track within it to ensure walkers are able to keep off the neighbouring fields as they enjoy the facility.

## Flower tubs

We once again filled six tubs around the village – at the Ploughman Hall, Public Hall and on the Green with colourful flowers, with a generous discount from the Hayden nursery. These tubs were originally organised by WAG and planting was shared with the Parish Council. This year we felt it was time to pass responsibility on to a village group and the Gardening Club took up the challenge and took over in the autumn.



## The wider community

Over the course of the year we have continued to keep in touch with both the WAG environment group and the zero carbon team at SCDC, including putting information on our website.

## BUSES AND CYCLEWAYS



### Bus route 5A

Following Stagecoach's decision to cut many of its services at the end of October, the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority (CPCA) stepped in to subsidise the new route 5A which runs in a circle from Longstanton via Swavesey, Over and Willingham and back to Longstanton. There have been issues with both the timetable and last-minute cancellations which have

deterred passengers. We have worked closely with our County Councillor and written to the CPCA to try to resolve these problems, and continue to press for a meeting with Stagecoach.

### GCP Making Connections Consultation

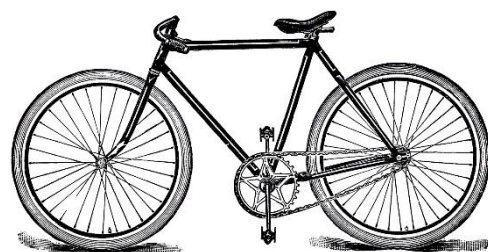
During the year the Greater Cambridge Partnership carried out its Making Connections consultation, on creating a 'world class' bus network to be paid for by a congestion charge (called a sustainable travel zone). The Parish Council has made vigorous representations that the proposal for Willingham is in no way world class. There would be no direct bus to Cambridge or St Ives or any other major town to which residents would want to travel. Instead we will be on an hourly loop via Longstanton, Bar Hill, Papworth and Swavesey. Taking two buses to get to Cambridge, one of them only hourly, is not an adequate service that will be preferred to a car (for those lucky enough to have one available). Based on this, paying a congestion charge is unfair.

This bus network is also being adopted by the CPCA for their long-term planning, as they are responsible for bus provision, and we have again strongly made the case that Willingham loses out.

### Cycling

The Parish Council has also responded to local government consultations on 'active travel' and pointed out that Willingham is very poorly served for cycleways. We have only one, to the Guided Busway. It is well-used but inadequate and dangerous as it is shared with pedestrians but very narrow and crossed by numerous driveways. All funding is currently concentrated on the GCP Greenways project, none of which is aimed at

Willingham. We have said that encouraging more cycling requires cycleways to Cottenham so that pupils at CVC have a safe option to cycle, to Over with which we have close connections, and Earith to link up with cycleways out into the Fens. A better cycleway to Longstanton P&R is also needed.

## SUBSIDISED FACILITY USE - 2022 – 2023

The Council continue to provide free use of the Pavilion and Recreation Ground for the Youth Teams in the village as well as reduced charges for community and education groups using the Ploughman Hall. Local Groups also benefit from the reduced cost of using the Public Hall which is currently leased to the User Committee and at present is mainly used by the Scout Group and the renovated section of the Ploughman Hall which is leased to Willingham Youth Trust.

## COMMUNITY LIFELINES

The Parish Council pays for the provision of fourteen community lifeline monitors from the District Council for residents who need them in the village. These lifelines are extremely valuable in helping to enable residents to remain independent and in their homes where possible.

## PLATINUM JUBILEE

The Council provided the use of the Recreation Ground free of charge and put a small budget aside for the picnic event to celebrate the Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II. Although the weather was not kind to us on the day, it was great to see people coming together and enjoying the music, food and company. We were also really pleased to be able to provide all the children of Willingham Primary School with bookmarks to commemorate Jubilee.

## HIGHWAYS

During this year the successful LHI (Local Highways Initiative) bid from 2022/2023 was for improves road marking in the 30mph stretch along Station Road implemented. Unfortunately, these markings have not proved to be very hard wearing and will need to be redone. As part of this at the instigation of one of the district councillors, improved road marking was installed along the bends between Berrycroft and Newington advising of the proximity of the school.

A new LHI has been put in to have priority give way features installed along Rampton Road and Over Road, the latter relocating the 30mph signs to the village boundary.



A new Speed Watch group has been set up with Parish Council support and a new set of enthusiastic volunteers are looking forward to starting checking on speeds especially along Earith Road.
